This newsletter covers the first 3 work parties of 2020, including the much anticipated Batlhako Hide reopening. As I was unable to make any of the work parties earlier this year, I was very excited to see this hide completed. On the committee weekend I had the privilege of spending some time there, the birdlife does not disappoint! There were kingfishers, a number of hammerkops, herons and many more! As well as a stunning fish eagle catching a fish right next to our lookout point! It was brilliant. Definitely a must when you are next in the park.

News from the park – In case you have missed anything....

All the Rhinos in the park were de-horned during the lockdown ②. This has been done to, hopefully, reduce the number of poachings in the park. Sad, that we have to resort to these measures to protect our wildlife, however, rather an alive Rhino than a poached one! Hopefully it works, so far it seems to have the number of Rhinos poached in the Pilanesberg this year is down!



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There have been a number of fires that have raged through the park in July and August. No major injuries to the larger animals that we are aware of, although we know that the smaller animals, insects and snakes generally get caught in these fires with no escape! We saw a very singed Zebra when we were on the committee work party, the poor guy had no mane to speak of and the beautiful eye lashes you normally see on Zebras were gone  $\Theta$ ! He was alive and seemed to be doing well though.

There was a block burn that was done in the Iron Age site and nearly all of the sickle bush "hedge" that we have accumulated over the years is gone! Woo Hoo! Thank you PWT, one major fire hazard done away with. We just have to find a way to remove whatever we cut back going forward as we do not want to build this "hedge" up again!

We are pausing our feature of the invasive species we are tackling in the park, and have decided to feature a "Botanical Gem of the park" each quarter. This "quarter" we will be doing a comparison between the Lantana Rugosa the one we love and the Invasive Lantana Camara. As I am not a plant expert, I searched the internet for information on the differences between the two species and have put a table together which will clear up the differences, this is at the end of this newsletter. It took a while and the thesaurus was definitely my friend this week, I know most of you would probably know, but.... "a plant having **antrorse** hairs on the stem" actually means that "the plant has hairs on the stem that are bent or curved forward or upward"! Speak English please, laymen like me just need simple words!

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### **Lantana Comparison**

	Lantana Rugosa – The Good One	Lantana Camara – The Invader
General	A much-branched shrub up to 2 m tall, or sometimes a	Mostly a spreading shrub 0.35–5 m tall, forming dense
	woody perennial 45–90 cm tall	thickets, or climber to 10, strongly aromatic
Flowers		
	The plant grows small, stalked pink to mauve flowers in almost globe shaped clusters up to 20mm x 20mm from leaf axils.	Flowers in ± flat clustered heads, 2–5 cm in diameter with axis 6–12 mm long, variously coloured, orange, red, pink, mauve, pure yellow or white, often with a yellow or orange centre.
Leaves		
	Leaves usually opposite, ovate-oblong, up to 7 cm long, rounded at the base, with whitish tubercle-based hairs above, becoming rough with age, covered in short stiff hairs beneath. Dark Green	The leaves are simple and opposite along the stem. They have leaf stalks that are 5-30 mm long with a serrated (toothed) margin. The leaves are mostly eggshaped in outline with broad end at base and are 2-12 x 1.5-7 cm in size. The texture of the leaf is quite rough, however, the underside can be softly hairy. Light Green.

	Drupes 2.5–3.5 mm long, purple or wine-coloured on ripening	Drupes 3–6 mm in diameter, purple-black to black on ripening
