
Letter from the Editor

Poaching hits the Pilanesberg! By Perry Dell

In the opening month of 2016 the poachers have hit the Pilanesberg National Park really hard.

3 Rhinos were shot at, and killed, for their horns. Of these, one was a female Rhino! It is a most horrific scene to witness and truly heart breaking, as these animals are such gentle giants with no means of protection against poachers with high calibre rifles.

Another 3 Rhinos were shot at, but have luckily survived the attempts on their lives.

Dr Gerhardus Scheepers had his work cut out in treating the Rhinos and hopefully they will recover 100% to survive another scary day in the wild!

In the photos you will see the bullet wounds and even the trajectory of the bullet as it narrowly missed the Rhinos 2 leg bones (fibula and tibia) in 2 of the cases.

The other Rhino's wound is a shoulder wound which is a lot more problematic as the bone has been hit as well.

Pilanesberg NP is not part of SanParks, and relies heavily on the Pilanesberg Wildlife Trust for funds to assist in the Rhino poaching scourge.

90% of veterinary and helicopter costs are covered by the PWT.

The PWT also supports the Rhino Protection Unit (RPU) by making funds available for all their equipment and training needs that are deemed necessary.

The PWT relies on fundraising projects, curio sales in the Park, and donations to make assisting the PNP possible.

Rhino with bullet wound follow up treatment. By Perry Dell

This Rhino was spotted a couple of days ago and she was limping really badly. We are not sure what caused this really large wound right next to the bullet wound which we treated a while ago.

After immobilising her we could see that the old wound is clean, and has healed. However, the same leg has a huge hole as well as a broken 'ankle'.

The damage could be from another Rhino or Elephant, or something else, we cannot tell unfortunately.

Dr Gerhardus Scheepers treated her as much as was possible in the field, but the damage is quite severe.

The Rhino is not able to put weight on her leg, and we will probably have to get specialized help for her.

Injured Rhino - 3rd treatment. By Perry Dell

Yesterday, Dr Johan Marais of Saving the Survivors came through to the Pilanesberg to assist us with treating Shannon (we have named the Rhino now!) Also joining us was Dr Gerhardus Scheepers who had treated Shannon on the 2 previous occasions.

As you may be aware, Shannon's injury is the result of a botched poaching. Though the poachers managed to shoot and injure Shannon, she obviously got away! But not unharmed.

Saturday 6 Feb we treated Shannon for another very severe wound (besides her bullet wound that we treated 2 weeks ago) that could be from another Rhino or Elephant. Or possibly as a result of the bullet, where further damage resulted as time went on...

After Dr Scheepers had darted Shannon on foot to immobilise her, treatment was started in earnest. Her little Rhino friend, Elizabeth, still ever present...like she was on Saturday too....

Shannon's wound definitely looked worse than it did on Saturday, and after cleaning the wound it was treated with L- Mesitran (medical grade honey), which has remarkable healing properties. Dr Marais then did X-rays to determine the extent of the fracture in Shannon's leg. It was concluded that a cast was necessary.

The mobile X-ray you see being used here is extremely expensive, but necessary in situations like this one where it is impossible to move the animal to a proper medical facility.

Before applying the cast, the wound was covered with silver microbial gauze that has antibiotic and antibacterial properties to help heal the wound and prevent infection. Splints were applied to the cast to add

support to the leg. With all the work completed we rolled Shannon into an easier position for her to get up from, and watched her from a distance. Elizabeth (her friend) immediately came to check on her and encouraged her to get up.

We were overjoyed at Shannon's progress, and the ease with which she got up and walked (a little uncomfortably but better than with the broken leg).

I will keep you posted on Shannon's progress, but please note that this is a first for all of us. Though we do the best we can, Shannon might not make it if the injuries prove to be more than she can deal with and beyond our treating capabilities.

Thank you very much to Dr Johan Marais and Saving the Survivors for coming to Shannon's aid, and to our assistance!

Farewell Shannon....By Perry Dell

It is with the heaviest of hearts that we report Shannon's death. Until her death, Shannon was seen grazing and moving around with her cast intact, and her faithful companion Elizabeth at her side.

Vet, Dr Gerhardus Scheepers did a post-mortem on Shannon. After removing the cast to check for infection and cause of death, he determined that she had had an embolism, either through her heart, or through her brain. The cast was still fully intact.

There are no struggle marks where Shannon fell. She died instantly, without pain or anguish. Elizabeth was with Shannon till the end.

When Shannon was treated for her extensive wounds the Vets cautioned that she was still at risk. Yet we all hoped and prayed that she would overcome the odds. That is our nature.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for the incredible support and well wishes for Shannon

2 Rhino bulls shot and Injured. By Perry Dell

After hearing 2 shots in the Park, the Rhino Protection Unit went to investigate and found 2 Rhinos with bullet wounds.

Maxillo-facial specialist from Saving the Surviviors Dr Gerard Steenkamp, and Vet Dr Gerhardus Scheepers from Zodiac, were called in to treat the 2 Rhino bulls.

Both Rhinos had bullet wounds that accounted for the 2 shots heard...The one has an entry and exit wound to the face and he was treated for these. The bullet only just misses his eye...we are hoping the damage to the eye will not have long term consequences, and that his vision will not be affected.

X-rays were taken to determine any internal injuries as well.

The bull was given antibiotics and the wound cleaned before being treated with L Mesitran - medical honey. It was decided that this bull needed go to an unknown location where he can get the necessary treatment to aid his recovery. He left for his new home yesterday. We have named this bull "Tlotlo" which means respect.

Please respect Rhinos, and other animals who do not have a voice of their own. They have rights too.

The 2nd bull we treated was a young lad ... probably about 2 years of age. He had a wound to the leg and once again the bullet left the body!

X-rays were done and it was determined that no bones were damaged. He was also treated with antibiotics, wounds cleaned, and L-Mesitran was applied. We have named him Keitumetse which means "I am thankful" in Setswana...

Once all the work was done, the young lad was woken up and released to go his own way.

Thanks again to Dr Steenkamp and Saving the Survivors for responding and treating both Rhinos. The work you do is priceless and your passion is appreciated.

Also to all the RPU's that reacted so fast to get to the animals and preventing them from being slayed. We appreciate your dedication and we thank you sincerely for the work you do.

To all that assisted on the day, thank you too.

A reminder that it is only Lindy who organises tent bookings, (and not Bronwyn/ secretary) so please ensure that you contact Lindy, preferably on her Cell: +27.82.890.0534

Please note: Only paid up, current FOPS members may use the tents on the basis of ONE TENT per membership. You may not book all 3 tents for yourself and friends who are not members. If you can't remember if you renewed your membership, contact Bronwyn (secretary@fops.org.za) to check.

The FOPS tent area is part of the Golden Leopard concession and FOPS have to adhere to the rules and regulations set, so pitching additional tents/roof top tents/caravans NEXT to the FOPS tents if you want more space may result in FOPS losing the use of the area & tents, and therefore a valuable source of income. Please don't think because Lindy isn't there when you arrive and pitch your additional tents that the FOPS committee does not get advised of this, as we do each time. NOR can you 'arrange' with Lindy to do this when booking your tent.

If you need additional accommodation when you book a FOPS tent, make arrangements with reservations to book a camp site adjacent to the FOPS tents.

Reminder of HOW TO BOOK:

- Call LINDY— Cell: +27 82 890 0534 to enquire if the date you would like is available & book the date with her at a rate of R200 per tent per night
- Email proof of payment to coombeheathglenda@gmail.com. Reference: membership number & tents. Banking details same as membership, and on the website.
- Please call Lindy to check that she has received your proof of payment, and that booking is CONFIRMED.

Please do not assume your booking is confirmed just because you sent an email, or paid into the account.

Please be considerate – if you book a tent, and cannot make your booking please tell Lindy a minimum of one week (7 days) prior, so we can notify other members that it is available.

Tents are self-catering and not serviced. **Please clean them after your use.** Any problems or breakages please report to Lindy after your weekend.

NB: Please be careful- DO NOT leave valuables in the tents. Rather keep these items on you or out of sight in your locked vehicle- during a recent burglary, a tent window was slashed and valuables were stolen while the occupants were visiting friends in the adjacent tent.

Attending Work Parties

Please remember that FOPS only operates in the parks at the INVITATION & APPROVAL of the Parks

Board, so there is a procedure to follow:

ONE WEEK BEFORE THE WORK PARTY:

- 1. CALL or SMS the RELEVANT work party co-ordinator ie. Pilanesberg Paddy or Dennis to check that there is space and to have your name added to the list.
- 2. Provide your vehicle registration and number of people attending
- 3. CONFIRM your arrival time remember FOPS has to adhere to the gate times in the parks. So if you are not going to make the gate closing time, special arrangements need to be made at the discretion of the work party co-ordinator. So please try to be in the park by the gate closing time on the FRIDAY.
- 4. DO NOT email the day before a work party, please always give notice and confirm that they have your name on the list at the gate.
- 5. To send an email to TENTS (Lindy) or to book a tent for the weekend at Manyane, or to send an email to SECRETARY (Bronwyn) **DOES NOT BOOK YOU FOR WORK PARITES.** You can only book with work party co-ordinators.

Well next month is the last work party of the year, and the Christmas party. Hope to see you there.






