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weekends, as many of our members who have young children are often unable to attend. 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A reminder that it is only Lindy who organises tent bookings, (and not Bronwyn/ secretary) so please ensure that you contact Lindy, preferably on her Cell: +27 82 890 0534

Please note: Only paid up, current FOPS members may use the tents on the basis of ONE TENT per membership. You may not book all 3 tents for yourself and friends who are not members. If you can't remember if you renewed your membership, contact Bronwyn (secretary@fops.org.za) to check.

The FOPS tent area is part of the Golden Leopard concession and FOPS have to adhere to the rules and regulations set, so pitching additional tents/roof top tents/caravans NEXT to the FOPS tents if you want more space may result in FOPS losing the use of the area & tents, and therefore a valuable source of income. Please don't think because Lindy isn't there when you arrive and pitch your additional tents that the FOPS committee does not get advised of this, as we do each time. NOR can you 'arrange' with Lindy to do this when booking your tent.

If you need additional accommodation when you book a FOPS tent, make arrangements with reservations to book a camp site adjacent to the FOPS tents.

Reminder of HOW TO BOOK:

- Call LINDY– Cell: +27 82 890 0534 to enquire if the date you would like is available & book the date with her
- Email proof of payment to lindys1@worldonline.co.za. Reference: membership number & tents. Banking details same as membership, and on the website.
- Please call Lindy to check that she has received your proof of payment, and that booking is CONFIRMED.

Please do not assume your booking is confirmed just because you sent an email, or paid into the account. Please be considerate – if you book a tent, and cannot make your booking please tell Lindy a minimum of one week (7 days) prior, so we can notify other members that it is available.

Tents are self-catering and not serviced. **Please clean them after your use.** Any problems or breakages please report to Lindy after your weekend.

NB: Please be careful- DO NOT leave valuables in the tents. Rather keep these items on you or out of sight in your locked vehicle- during a recent burglary, a tent window was slashed and valuables were stolen while the occupants were visiting friends in the adjacent tent.

Please remember that FOPS only operates in the parks at the INVITATION & APPROVAL of the Parks

Board, so there is a procedure to follow:

ONE WEEK BEFORE THE WORK PARTY:

- 1. CALL or SMS the RELEVANT work party co-ordinator e.g. Bora Mark Morris; Kgaswane Buks; Pilanesberg – Paddy to check that there is space and to have your name added to the list.
- 2. Provide your vehicle registration number of people attending
- 3. CONFIRM your arrival time remember FOPS has to adhere to the gate times in the parks. So if you are not going to make the gate closing time, special arrangements need to be made at the discretion of the work party co-ordinator. So please try to be in the park by the gate closing time on the FRIDAY.
- 4. DO NOT email the day before a work party, please always give notice and confirm that they have your name on the list at the gate.
- 5. To send an email to TENTS (Lindy) or to book a tent for the weekend at Manyane, or to send an email to SECRETARY (Bronwyn) **DOES NOT BOOK YOU FOR WORK PARITES.** You can only book with work party co-ordinators.

I just want to say well done to the whole team for the jobs well done. Thank you all.







